In addition to her work in Genealogy, Keila has an extensive background in public affairs and media, and continues to serve as a member of the American Red Cross national Rapid Response Team responsible for national and international press during disaster and emergent events. Keila serves as the CEO for the American Red Cross Regional Chapter headquartered in Charlottesville, which provides programs and services to 14 central Virginia counties.

Cooperative Genealogy: Working Together on Research – Coordinating with family members on shared research can be challenging. We will discuss how to divide up the work, focusing on individual interests and talents, and how to exchange and evaluate others contributions. Genealogy Resources In Our Area - A look at the resources available to the genealogist and family history buff within the state and the nation's capital. Especially appropriate for those with family roots in the state of Virginia. (Margaret O'Bryant, ACHS)

REUNION 9.08 — Put Your Apple MAC To Work! – Reunion is the premier Genealogy software for users of Apple Computers. Learn the features of this comprehensive software which contains features for the LDS and non-LDS family history researcher. Learn how to import GEDCOM files, attach photographs, movies and audio content, produce family trees, web cards and more. And with the 2009 update, learn how you can load your Reunion family history on to your iPhone for ultimate portability! (Peter Sweeny, Guest)

The Price is Right: Free Online Research – First as a poor college student and now as a busy mother of three girls, Katie has become an

expert in what is available online for free to the Genealogy researcher. She will give demonstrations of some of the most useful sites online and discuss techniques for evaluating the accuracy of information found on the internet. (Katie Derby, FHC)

You Say It's FREE?!? – Creative Online Tools – Learn how to use free multimedia tools to your geneological work. In this class, you will learn how to start your own simple web site using blogging software and how to add photos, videos, slideshows, and interactive maps that will enhance collaboration and help excite the younger generation about family history. (Rob Roberts, Guest)

Researching Your WW-II Military Ancestors – This session will provide an overview of "getting started" with military research and what questions to ask. Participants will view the types of records available and where to obtain the records. Online resources will be shown, including the research tracking Tsgt. Calvin Clark Davis service in WWII. Tsgt. Davis, a Negro, joined the military in May of 1941, with the military assuming he was white. Davis flew over 50 mission in the Pacific, then on to Europe completing 16 missions before being shot down on November 30, 1944. (Shelley Murphy, CVGA/AAHS)

3:00 Classes

African-American Research – Getting Started - A "how to get started" class designed for the person who is new to Genealogy and African American research. Class will cover the basics of conducting Genealogy research, tips on how to manage your files, learn where to obtain birth, death, will information, etc. Learn about popular online research data bases and specific research tips for African-American research. (Shelly Murphy, CVGA/AAHG)

What Is In Your DNA ?? - This class will answer basic questions about DNA and its current and possible contributions to genealogical work. Question we will answer include: What is DNA? How is it used to identify individuals? How can it be used to find my ancestors? What options are currently available to use DNA in Genealogy? (Sergio Sanchez, Guest)

Making Sense of the Census – Kelia will cover the history and availability of the US Federal Census schedule and the information that each year's schedules contained. She will help revel some of the “hidden” value of the statistics and information available about your ancestors in the census. (Kelia Rader, Guest)

Tracing My Military Ancestors All The Way To 1776 – The class will recount a novice's journey along multiple paths to develop often detailed information regarding the military history of his ancestors spanning the American Revolution, the War of 1812, the War Between the States, World War II and Korea. The focus will be on methods of finding historic details of family military history. (Peter Sweeny, Guest)

PRESENTER BIOGRAPHIES

Please recognize and thank our speakers who are voluntarily participating in the Conference because of their love of Family History and Genealogy. They include volunteers and patrons of the Family History Center, many are members of the LDS Church, The Albemarle-Charlottesville Historical Society, or the Central Virginia Genealogy Association which was founded at the Charlottesville FHCenter almost 40 years ago. They all have our thanks and gratitude for sharing their talents, interests, and, above all, the spirit of Family.

Dr. SCOT FRENCH, our 2009 Keynote Speaker, is Director of the Virginia Center for Digital History and Associate Professor of History at UVa. A scholar of race and slavery in American history and culture, he directs a number of community-based research projects and field learning experiences exploring the theme of “Race and Place.” His book, *The Rebellious Slave: Nat Turner in American Memory* (Houghton Mifflin, 2004), received honorable mention in the 2005 Gustavus Myers Award competition, issued annually for works “which extend our understanding of the root causes of bigotry and the range of options we as humans have in constructing alternative ways to share power.” Last year, in partnership with VCDH Director of Technology Bill Ferster, he received an NEH Digital Humanities Start-Up Grant for “Jefferson's Travels: A Digital Journey Using the History Browser.”

Other projects at the Virginia Center for Digital History include *The Valley of the Shadow: Two Communities in the American Civil War*, *Virtual Jamestown*, and the *Dolley Madison Project* as well as latest initiatives like the HistoryBrowser. Dr. French and his associates are applying the latest advances in technology to historical projects which can support genealogical and family history research efforts.

SHEILA BLIGHT is a grandmother who has been writing or keeping a journal of some kind or another since she was 13 years old. She enjoys tracing her own family tree and has worked as a Family History Library volunteer.

KATIE DERBY received her Bachelor's Degree in Family History/ Genealogy from Brigham Young University. She interned at the Library of Congress in the Local History/ Genealogy Reading Room. She has been a speaker at regional and national level Genealogy conferences and societies. She served as a volunteer librarian and teacher for the Charlottesville Family History Center, but now spends most of her time with her growing family. For this conference, Katie served as Curriculum Director.

SUSAN DUBAR is an officer in the Central Virginia Genealogical Association and has been engaged in Genealogical research for ten years or more, and has been presenting programs on various aspects of Genealogy.

SUSAN EMERT has been researching her Family History for over ten years, and began her first Heritage Scrapbook in 1999. She has taught classes in scrapbook construction, and she and Susan DuBar teach a course in Beginning Genealogy for OLLIE. Susan is President of the Central Virginia Genealogical Association and volunteers in the Family History Center as a Librarian.

JENNY GREENWOOD has lived in Charlottesville since 1969 and has been a member of the Central Virginia Genealogy Association since 1990 serving as Recording Secretary and Vice President for several years. She has been a presenter at several CVGA Genealogy seminars in the area.
